This document was prepared in accordance with FTA Circular 4702.1B, dated October 1, 2012.

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#### I. Policy Statement

The Limestone County Commission ensures compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 49 CFR, Part 21, and related statutes and regulations to the end that "no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance" (42 U.S.C. Section 2000d) including the denial of meaning access for Limited English Proficient (LEP) persons.

The purpose of this plan is to assist the Limestone County Commission in its administration and management of activities related to Title VI. The Limestone County Commission's Title VI Coordinator is Christa McCurry, Grant, Public Relations, Legal Specialist, who can be contacted at 256-216-3433 and/or christa.mccurry@limestonecounty-al.gov.

#### II. Notice to the Public

The Limestone County Commission has developed a Title VI Notice to provide information to the public regarding the Limestone County Commission's Title VI obligations and to inform the public of the protections against discrimination afforded to them by Title VI. The notice also includes contact information to file a discrimination complaint with the Limestone County Commission as well as information to file a complaint directly with the Federal Transit Administration (FTA).

The Limestone County Commission has posted the Title VI Notice on the agency's website and in the agency's office receptionist area. The notice is also posted in all transit vehicles. This notice will be translated into other languages as needed. A copy of the notice is included as Appendix A.

#### III. Complaint Procedures and Form

A Title VI complaint may be filed by any individual or individuals who allege that they have been subjected to discrimination or adverse impact under any FTA funded program or activity based on race, color, or national origin. The Limestone County Commission adopted Title VI complaint procedures to investigate and track complaints. A formal, signed, written Title VI complaint form must be filed within 180 days of the date of the alleged act of discrimination. A copy of the complaint form is included in Appendix B. The complaint procedures and complaint form are also posted on the Limestone County Commission's website. If information is needed in another language, the complainant can contact 256-233-6400. The statement "If information is needed in another language, contact 256-233-6400" will be posted with the complaint procedures in English and in any

other language(s) spoken by LEP populations that meet the Safe Harbor threshold.

Once the complaint is received, the Limestone County Commission will review it to determine who has jurisdiction. The complainant will receive an acknowledgement letter informing them whether the complaint will be investigated by the Limestone County Commission's office. The Limestone County Commission will only process complaint forms that are complete and signed.

In a situation where the complainant is unable or incapable of providing a written complaint, a verbal complaint of discrimination may be made to the Limestone County Commission. Under these circumstances, the complainant will be interviewed and the Limestone County Commission will assist the complainant in converting the verbal allegations to a formal written complaint.

The Limestone County Commission has 15 business days to investigate the complaint. If more information is needed to resolve the case, the Limestone County Commission may contact the complainant. The complainant has 15 business days from the date of this letter to send requested information to the investigator assigned to the case. If the investigator does not receive the additional information from the complainant within 15 business days, the Limestone County Commission can administratively close the case. A case can also be administratively closed if the complainant no longer wishes to pursue the case.

After the investigator reviews the complaint, they will issue one of two letters to the complainant: a closure letter or a letter of finding (LOF). A closure letter summarizes the allegations and states that there was not a Title VI violation and that the case will be closed. A LOF summarizes the allegations and the interviews regarding the alleged incident and explains whether any disciplinary action, additional training of the accused staff member, or other action will occur. If the complainant wishes to appeal the decision, they have 15 days after the date of the closure letter or the LOF to submit an appeal letter to the Limestone County Commission.

If the complainant is not satisfied with actions taken locally or if they demand further action, the complaint will be referred to:

#### IV. Transit-Related Investigations, Complaints, and Lawsuits

The Limestone County Commission shall maintain a log of Title VI complaints received. The log shall include the date the complaint was filed, a summary of the allegations, the status of the complaint, and actions taken in response to the complaint. Active Title VI transit-related investigations and lawsuits shall also be included in this log. This log shall be included in the Title VI Program that is submitted to ALDOT every three years.

No Title VI transit-related investigations, complaints, or lawsuits have occurred since the previous submission of the Title VI Program to ALDOT. A template of the Log of Transit-Related Title VI Transit Investigations, Complaints, and Lawsuits that will be used if a complaint or lawsuit is filed can be found in Appendix C.

#### V. Public Participation Plan

The Limestone County Commission commits to provide early and continuous opportunities for public participation in the transit decision-making process. These opportunities are open to everyone including minority, low-income, and Limited English Proficient (LEP) populations. The Public Participation Plan provides for an open exchange of information and ideas between the public and transit decision makers. The Limestone County Commission's Public Participation Plan is ongoing and reviewed regularly to identify, meet, and serve the community's needs.

In an effort to integrate the opinions of minority, low-income, and LEP populations into community outreach activities, the Limestone County Commission's Public Participation Plan will:

- Coordinate with community-based organizations to identify and implement strategies to reach out to members in the affected minority, low-income, and LEP communities.
- Reduce barriers to public participation from these segments of the population.
- Place public notices on the County website, in the County receptionist area, on the Kidney and Council On Aging transportation vehicles, and at both the Dialysis and Council of Aging facilities.
- Utilize the media (newspaper) to notify minority, low-income, and LEP populations of public involvement efforts.
- Hold public meetings in locations, facilities, and at meeting times that are convenient and accessible to the minority, low-income, and LEP populations.
- Ensure the decision-making process adequately considers the issues and concerns raised by minority, low-income, and LEP populations.
- Develop Title VI brochures in English and other languages as needed.
- Make public information available in electronically accessible formats.

To date, the Limestone County Commission has participated in the following public outreach and involvement activities:

- Public notices have been posted on the County website, in the County receptionists area, on the Kidney Van, at Dialysis facilities, and Council On Aging Facilities.
- Title VI brochures have been developed in English.

The Public Participation Plan is evaluated with the assistance of the public who participate in public involvement activities and events. The Public Participation Effectiveness Survey in Appendix D is used to monitor changes in demographics and track the effectiveness of the Limestone County Commission's public involvement activities and events held inperson and virtually. Names are not collected so responses are anonymous. The survey is available in English and languages that are commonly spoken by LEP persons in the Limestone County Commission's service area. Participants are encouraged to request assistance from staff members as needed.

Surveys completed after in-person activities and events are deposited into drop boxes by participants. Drop boxes are positioned near exits and clearly labeled in English and languages that are commonly spoken by LEP persons in the Limestone County Commission's service area.

#### VI. Limited English Proficiency Plan

The Four Factor Analysis is used to identify Limited English Proficient (LEP) persons who need language assistance, outline how language assistance is provided, and describe how the Limestone County Commission considers the needs of LEP persons. This assessment balances the following four factors:

- 1. The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible to be served or likely to be encountered by a program, activity, or service sponsored by the Limestone County Commission. In addition to the number or proportion of LEP persons served, the analysis identifies:
  - A. How LEP persons interact with the Limestone County Commission;
  - B. Where LEP communities are located and the number or proportion of LEP persons from each language group to determine the appropriate language services for each language group;
  - C. The literacy skills of LEP populations in their native languages to determine whether document translation will be an effective practice or whether translated auditory resources will be more effective; and
  - D. Whether or not LEP persons are underserved by the Limestone County Commission due to language barriers.
- The frequency with which LEP persons come into contact with the Limestone County Commission's program, activities, or services. The following areas were evaluated:
  - A. Kidney Van Driver, Council On Aging Drivers
  - B. Information Lines at the facilities
  - C. Public meeting participation
  - D. Dispatchers (Dialysis Facility and Hospital)
  - E. Reservationist (Dialysis Facility and Council On Aging Facilities)
  - F. Receptionist (Dialysis Facility, Limestone County Commission, and all Council On Aging Facilities)
  - G. Meals on Wheels volunteers, insurance counseling, legal assistance programs, and in-home services.

- 3. The nature and importance of programs, activities, or services provided by the Limestone County Commission to people's lives.
- 4. The resources available to the Limestone County Commission for outreach to LEP persons and the costs associated with that outreach.

The Limestone County Commission developed a Limited English Proficiency Plan which is located in Appendix E. It includes:

- Results of the Four Factor Analysis, including a description of the LEP population(s) served;
- A description of how language assistance services will be provided;
- The methods used by the Limestone County Commission to provide language assistance services;
- A description of how employees are trained to provide timely and reasonable language assistance to LEP populations;
- A description of how notice is provided to LEP persons about the availability of language assistance; and
- An explanation of how the plan is monitored, evaluated, and updated.

#### Safe Harbor Provision

In accordance with the Safe Harbor Provision, the Limestone County Commission identified the following language group which exceed the threshold of 1,000 persons or 5%, whichever is less, of the total population eligible to be served by the program: Spanish. This language group was identified by using the Limited English Proficiency Assessment and the Staff Survey - Limited English Proficiency Interactions. The assessment and survey are included in Appendix E along with a copy of the current census data for the Limestone County Commission's service area.

The Limestone County Commission focuses translation efforts in Spanish, which is the largest language group other than English. Vital documents such as public notices, complaint forms, and complaint procedures are available in Spanish. The Limestone County Commission also provides free translation services upon request.

#### VII. Minority Representation on Planning and Advisory Bodies

The Limestone County Commission will not deny a person the opportunity to participate as a member of a planning, advisory, or similar body which is an integral part of the program on the grounds of race, color, or national origin.

The Limestone County Commission does not have transit-related non-elected planning boards, advisory councils, or committees that are selected by the Limestone County Commission. If the Limestone County Commission establishes advisory bodies, a table will be used to depict the racial breakdown of the membership and will be included in future Title VI programs. A sample table is included in Appendix F. Additionally, a description of efforts made to encourage the participation of minorities on such committees will be included.

#### VIII. Guidance on Determining Site or Location of Facilities

When acquiring land and/or constructing facilities, the Limestone County Commission shall not make selections with the purpose or effect of excluding persons from, denying them the benefits of, or subjecting them to discrimination under any Federally funded transit program based on the grounds of race, color, or national origin. The Limestone County Commission shall comply with all Federal requirements including 49 CFR Part 21 and FTA Circular 4702.1B and subsequent provisions.

The Limestone County Commission will complete a Title VI equity analysis during the planning stage of any new facility related to the potential site location to ensure the location is selected without regard to race, color, or national origin. Wherever necessary and/or required, the Limestone County Commission will engage in outreach to persons potentially impacted by the placement of facilities. A Title VI equity analysis will be completed before the site selection to compare the equity impacts of various alternatives. A copy of the Title VI Construction Project Analysis form that will be used to perform the equity analysis can be found in Appendix G.

#### X. Board Meeting Resolution of Approved Title VI Program

Una vez recibida la denuncia, la Limestone County Commission la revisará para determinar quién tiene jurisdicción. El denunciante recibirá una carta de constancia de recibo informándole si la denuncia será investigada por la oficina de la Limestone County Commission. La Limestone County Commission solo procesará formularios de queja que estén completos y firmados.

En caso de que el denunciante no pueda presentar una denuncia por escrito, se puede presentar una denuncia verbal de discriminación a la Limestone County Commission. En estas circunstancias, se entrevistará al denunciante y la Limestone County Commission. ayudará al denunciante a convertir las alegaciones verbales en una denuncia formal por escrito.

La Limestone County Commission tiene 15 días hábiles para investigar la denuncia. Si se necesita más información para resolver el caso, la Limestone County Commission puede comunicarse con el denunciante. El denunciante tiene 15 días hábiles a partir de la fecha de esta carta para enviar la información solicitada al investigador asignado al caso. Si el investigador no recibe la información adicional del denunciante dentro de los 15 días hábiles, la Limestone County Commission puede cerrar administrativamente el caso. Un caso también se puede cerrar administrativamente si el denunciante ya no desea continuar con el caso.

Después de que el investigador revise la denuncia, emitirá una de dos cartas al denunciante: una carta de cierre o una carta de hallazgo (LOF por sus siglas en ingles). Una carta de cierre resume las acusaciones y establece que no hubo una violación del Título VI y que el caso se cerrará. Una LOF resume las alegaciones y las entrevistas con

respecto al presunto incidente y explica si se tomará alguna acción disciplinaria, capacitación adicional del miembro del personal acusado u otra acción. Si el denunciante desea apelar la decisión, tiene 15 días después de la fecha de la carta de cierre o LOF para presentar una carta de apelación a la Limestone County Commission.

Si el denunciante no está satisfecho con las acciones tomadas localmente o si exige una acción adicional, la denuncia se remitirá a:



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

#### Introduction

This Limited English Proficiency Plan was prepared to address the Limestone County Commission's responsibilities as a recipient of Federal financial assistance relating to the needs of individuals with limited English proficiency. This plan was prepared in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d, et seq. and its implementing regulations which state that no person shall be subjected to discrimination based on race, color, or national origin.

#### **Plan Summary**

The Limestone County Commission developed this Limited English Proficiency Plan to help identify reasonable steps to provide language assistance to persons with limited English proficiency who wish to access transit services provided by the Limestone County. As defined in Executive Order 13166, LEP persons are those who do not speak English as their primary language and/or have limited ability to read, speak, write, or understand English.

This Plan outlines how the Limestone County Commission identifies a person who may need language assistance, the ways in which assistance may be provided, staff training that may be required, and how LEP persons are notified that assistance is available.

As the first step in preparing this plan, the Limestone County Commission completed the U.S. DOT Four Factor Analysis which considers the following factors:

- The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible to be served or likely to be encountered by a program, activity, or service sponsored by the Limestone County Commission.
- 2. The frequency with which LEP persons come into contact with the Limestone County Commission's programs, activities, or services
- 3. The nature and importance of programs, activities, or services provided by the Limestone County Commission to people's lives
- 4. The resources available to the Limestone County Commission for outreach to LEP persons and the costs associated with that outreach.

#### Four Factor Analysis Results

1. The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible to be served or likely to be encountered by a program, activity, or service sponsored by the Limestone County Commission.

The Limestone County Commission reviewed the 2020 U.S. Census Report and determined that the total population for Limestone County is 91,525. Of those persons, 1,946 (2.1%) residents report speaking English less than very well. Those persons with limited English proficiency speak the following languages at home: 1,351 speak Spanish, 347 speak other Indo-European languages, 213 speak Asian and Pacific Island languages, and 35 speak other languages. The most popular language spoken at home (other than English) is Spanish. The **Limestone County Commission** will likely encounter more persons who speak Spanish that benefit from the transit programs than any other LEP persons.

# 2. The frequency with which LEP persons come into contact with the Limestone County Commission's programs, activities, or services

The Limestone County Commission assessed the frequency with which staff and drivers have contact with LEP persons both presently and in the past. The following contact points and frequencies were identified:

## 3. The nature and importance of programs, activities, or services provided by the Limestone County Commission to people's lives

The Limestone County Commission provides transportation for our residents to the Dialysis Centers. There is one van transporting residents, three times weekly, to two Dialysis Facilities. This service is very important to the community, because for many residents, it is the only means of transportation to their dialysis appointments. We also have vehicles that transport older residents to the Council On Aging Centers for their daily activities. We provide transportation for medical appointments, trips to nutrition centers, personal errands, and grocery shopping. The Council On Aging also provides in-home services and Monday - Friday Meals On Wheels lunches. Currently, the Council On Aging is in the process of applying for a grant in hopes of adding an expansion van to assist those requiring wheelchairs. Without this service, many of our elderly residents would not be able to attend many activities and would not receive the care and social interaction that they need.

The largest geographic concentration of LEP individuals in the Limestone County Commission's service area communicates by speaking Spanish. These individuals

are often dependent upon our specialized transportation services. It is likely that the Limestone County Commission will encounter LEP individuals at community events.

# 4. The resources available to the Limestone County Commission for outreach to LEP persons and the costs associated with that outreach

The Limestone County Commission assessed its resources and determined that funds are available within the current budget for providing language assistance. The Limestone County Commission also determined which documents would be most beneficial if translated into other languages and the cost associated with this effort. An inventory of available organizations with which the Limestone County Commission could partner for outreach and translation efforts was also identified. In addition, bilingual staff, volunteer community agencies, and web-based translation services were identified as ways to reduce the cost of translation services.

#### **Limited English Proficiency Plan Outline**

Five action items comprise Limestone County Commission's Limited English Proficiency Plan:

- 1. Identify Individuals Requiring Language Assistance
- 2. Provide Language Assistance
- 3. Train Staff
- 4. Provide Notice to LEP Persons
- 5. Monitor and Update the Limited English Proficiency Plan

#### 1. Identify Individuals Requiring Language Assistance

The Limestone County Commission identifies an LEP person who requires language assistance by:

- Examining customer service records to identify language assistance that was received in the past at meetings, online, or over the phone to determine whether language assistance might be needed for similar situations in the future;
- Regularly surveying drivers and other first-line staff who have direct or indirect contact with LEP individuals; and
- Assigning a staff person to greet participants as they arrive at events sponsored by the Limestone County Commission. By engaging participants in conversation, staff may informally gauge each attendee's ability to speak and understand English.

#### 2. Provide Language Assistance

The Limestone County Commission assists an LEP person who requires language assistance by:

- Networking with local human service organizations that provide service to LEP individuals and seeking opportunities to provide information on the Limestone County Commission's programs and services through these organizations;
- Posting the Limestone County Commission's Title VI Notice, Complaint Procedures, Complaint Form, and Limited English Proficiency Plan on the Limestone County Commission's website;
- Providing travel training to LEP persons;
- Identifying in-house staff with other language abilities to assist with translation services;
- Providing a bilingual or multilingual Community Outreach Coordinator at community events and public hearings;
- Placing statements in notices, publications, and online content to notify LEP persons that free language interpreter services are available for meetings with a seven-day advance notice;
- Providing language translation for LEP persons in Route Guides;
- Utilizing a web-based translation service application such as Google Translate;
   and
- Utilizing telephone translation services.

#### 3. Train Staff

The Limestone County Commission will train staff members on their roles and responsibilities in providing meaningful access to services for LEP persons by:

- Developing a curriculum and corresponding presentation to educate staff on the Title VI requirements for providing meaningful access to services for LEP persons;
- Providing staff with a description of language assistance services offered by the Limestone County Commission;

 Providing staff with specific procedures to be followed when encountering a LEP person, including how to handle a potential Title VI complaint;

#### 4. Provide Notice to LEP Persons

The Limestone County Commission will provide notice to LEP persons in both oral and written communications by:

- Offering general information, such as hours of operation, fares, etc., on the Limestone County Commission's customer service line in multiple languages;
- Implementing the use of an automated greeting in both English and Spanish directing callers to select which language they prefer; and
- Providing the following written communications in both English and Spanish;
  - Introduction section of the Limestone County Commission's Route Guides which contains information on fares, accessibility, fare/ticket discounts, and general riding information;
  - Fliers onboard the Limestone County Commission's fleet containing information about route changes, rider alerts, fare increases, and public meetings;
  - Signage that displays safety or system policy information;
  - Interior bus signage displaying cash fare cost of monthly discount passes and special promotions and campaigns; and
  - o Title VI Notice, Complaint Procedures, and Complaint Form.

#### 5. Monitor and Update the Limited English Proficiency Plan

This plan is designed to be flexible and should be viewed as a work in progress. As such, it is important to consider whether new documents and services should be made accessible for LEP persons and to monitor changes in demographics and types of services.

The Limestone County Commission will update the Limited English Proficiency Plan as required by the U.S. DOT. At a minimum, the plan will be reviewed and updated when data from the most recent U.S. Census is made available, when clear and higher concentrations of LEP individuals are present in the Limestone County Commission's

service area, and/or during the process of updating the Limestone County Commission's Title VI Program.

The Limestone County Commission will monitor and update its Limited English Proficiency Plan by:

- Determining how the needs of LEP persons are addressed;
- Determining the current LEP population in the service area and whether the need for translation services has changed;
- Determining whether local language assistance programs are effective and sufficient to meet the need;
- Determining whether the Limestone County Commission's financial resources are sufficient to fund the needed language assistance efforts;
- Determining whether the Limestone County Commission has fully complied with the goals of the Limited English Proficiency Plan; and
- Determining whether complaints were received concerning the Limestone County Commission's failure to meet the needs of LEP individuals.

# <u>Dissemination of the Limestone County Commission's Limited English Proficiency</u> <u>Plan</u>

The Limited English Proficiency Plan will be disseminated to customers and the community by:

- Publishing the Limited English Proficiency Plan and the Title VI Program on the Limestone County Commission's website so that any person or agency with internet access can view and download these documents. Alternatively, any person or agency may request a copy of the documents at no cost via telephone, e-mail, mail, or in- person. LEP individuals may request that these plans be translated into various languages. If feasible, the Limestone County Commission will accommodate such requests.
- Sharing updates to the Limited English Proficiency Plan on the Limestone County Commission's social media sites.
- Distributing the Limited English Proficiency Plan to human service organizations in the service area.

#### **RESOLUTION ADOPTING A TITLE VI PROGRAM**

**WHEREAS**, the <u>Limestone County Commission</u> is a recipient of Federal financial assistance from the Alabama Department of Transportation in support of transit services which imposes certain obligations upon the recipient, including complying with the Title VI Federal requirements; and

**WHEREAS**, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, and national origin in programs and activities receiving Federal financial assistance; and

WHEREAS, the <u>Limestone County Commission</u> commits to assure that no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, or sex, as provided by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987 (PL 100.259), be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity regardless of the funding source;
